Master's Program (M.P.A. / M.A.) Graduate Research Assistantships in Water Resources

The *Water Resources Agency (WRA), Institute for Public Administration (IPA), College of Human Services, Education and Public Policy (CHEP) at the University of Delaware* is pleased to announce that graduate research assistantships are available for students interested in the Master's degree with a focus in Water Resources. Students may pursue the Master of Public Administration (M.P.A.) degree with a specialization in State and Local Government or the Master of Arts (M.A.) degree in Urban Affairs and Public Policy. The WRA, cosponsored by the State of Delaware, New Castle County, the City of Newark, the City of Wilmington, and the University of Delaware, is responsible for providing water resources assistance to State and local governments in Delaware and the Delaware Valley. The WRA serves the residents of Delaware and the University community in its water resources education, research, and service role.

This assistantship will provide an annual stipend of \$11,000 and tuition during the academic year for two years.

The Research Assistantships may focus on the public policy and technical implications of water supply, water quality, and watershed management. Research may include water resources theory, applications, and case studies in collaboration with IPA faculty and staff.



The Graduate School of Urban Affairs and Public Policy offers a nationally ranked, policy-focused M.A. program that prepares students for public affairs careers as policy analysts, planners, and researchers. The Master of Public Administration (M.P.A.) degree prepares men and women for career positions in government and the nonprofit sector.

The University of Delaware dates to 1743 and is now the land-grant, sea-grant, space-grant and urban-grant institution of higher learning for the First State of Delaware. The University enrollment is 18,000 students at the main campus in Newark, Delaware and at campuses in Wilmington, Dover, Georgetown, and Lewes.
